Member Profile

Kevin Bardsley

Growing up in the UK Denton near Manchester, I was influenced by my grandfather (fishing) and my father (aircraft and birds) both have been a huge influence on my life. All I wanted to do when leaving school 1974 was work on aircraft, I was lucky to get an apprenticeship with Hawker Siddeley as an aircraft engineer working on Nimrods, HS748's and



Handley Page Victors. In 1977 I transferred to British Aerospace at Warton on the west coast of Lancashire, where I was in the development section, working on pre production test aircraft. I met my wife Bev there shortly after and we married in 1980. In January 1982 we migrated to Australia, we arrived on Friday the 15th of January 1982, I had an interview the following Thursday and started with H C Sleigh Aviation the following week. After 18 months of study and exams I became a Licensed Aircraft Maintenance Engineer. I spent 5 years at Essendon airport working on general aviation aircraft before moving to Australian Airlines / QANTAS where I worked for 33 years. 12 years in heavy maintenance then 21 years in line maintenance, working on the tarmac before retiring in 2020. Whilst at QANTAS I was trained on Boeing 737 300/400 series Boeing 737-800, Airbus A300-B4, Airbus A330 200/300 series and the A380-800 series. My interest in birds started with the sea birds observed whilst out fishing, I needed to know what they were, so I purchased a book, The Australian Bird Guide to help. When I retired I decided to get serious with bird watching or as some say a 'twitcher', working a 4 day rotating 12hr shift sometimes it is difficult to participate on a regular basis with clubs. I found it hard to look through binoculars and record size, colour and behaviour, then look through the book to know which bird it was. They can be so quick. This is when I took up photography so I could study them later. I started with a Nikon D330 with a 300 mm lens then upgraded to a D7200 with a 150-600mm telephoto. I now use a Nikon D850 with the 150-600 mm lens and a 1.4 teleconverter. There are many bird apps now in which you show a picture and it will give you a suggestion of what it is, I use Merlin. We moved to Portarlington in 2019 full time, having had a house there for many years due to my other passion fishing. I am a member of Bellarine Birdlife and a bird watching group out of the Portarlington neighborhood house. I joined the Bellarine Camera Club to help me improve my results, the workshops they carry out and competitions with feedback from the judges are certainly helping. Even more, being around people who

have been into photography for many, many years with their knowledge and advice over coffee and a biscuit is one of the best parts of our meetings.
